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Opening Ceremony

We are proud to announce that this year, PS MUN celebrates its 15th anniversary, and thus, the prospects for a very special conference are already promising. With this year's journey beginning under the special theme "The Return of Empires," our opening ceremony was the main event of the day. Our press team was there to capture the moment and provide insight into the event. Our speakers welcomed the delegates and stressed the need for peace, diplomacy, and international cooperation. They drew on the history of empires to underline the importance of wisdom, dialogue, and ethical leadership, urging delegates to shape a future based on cooperation rather than domination.

The Return of the Empires

Throughout world history, empires such as the British and Ottoman expanded rapidly through warfare, and eventually managed to dominate vast territories for centuries. Nevertheless, their authority came to an end in the 20th Century, primarily due to decolonization and rise of independent nation-states. However, their collapse did not eliminate imperial ambition of several states, but it transformed it from direct territorial occupation into influence. This raises a critical question; who ultimately controls political, economic, and strategic decisions in the modern world?

The answer to this question lies in the changing nature of power in the modern international map. States are strengthening their influence through spheres of influence, military interventions, cultural hegemony, and economic dependency. Russia seeks to reconstitute its

influence in former Soviet territories, China is shaping global relations through the Belt and Road Initiative, while the United States maintains a military presence and political intervention in many parts of the world.

Russia

In other words, Russia sells gas to European countries via Nord Stream, making energy resources an important tool of influence and power. However, EU plans to end Russian gas imports by the end of 2027 and member states are called to submit their strategies to eliminate dependence on Russian gas (BBC, 2025). In addition, Russia maintains military bases in Armenia, Belarus, Georgia and Moldova, highlighting its strategic position on the European continent.

China

In 2013, China started its massive financial and geopolitical project, Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), which aims to connect it with Asia, the Middle

East, and Europe through trading and investing. Looking back at history, it seems that BRI played a similar role with the ancient Silk Road – a network of routes via both land and sea that connected China with regions as far as the Mediterranean sea, from the 2nd Century B.C. until the 15th Century A.D.

United States

Additionally, the United States maintains military bases around the world, including Europe, Africa, Asia and Australia. As being an active member of the UN and the World Bank, the US supports strategic economic partnerships. Last but not least, undoubtedly European countries tend to adopt American traditions such as Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Black Friday as well as American trends in fashion, technology, and innovation.

All in all, it seems that empires are not just a concept of the past. While the term might have lost

its initial and traditional meaning, its power and influence remain very much alive. Russia, China, and the United States are currently the main states that navigate the world map and attempt to exert influence across the globe in this complex landscape.

Social Media: Chasing the Filter

It is no secret that in modern times, social media is widely used by individuals of all age ranges, though mostly utilized by teenagers. Although social media was originally used as a means of making connections with people worldwide and keeping in touch, or communicating with your friends, nowadays it has an additional purpose. It is common to see teenagers posing in front of a camera, using unrealistic filters, posting their pictures online, but also

seeing them spend hours in front of a screen, scrolling through pictures of others. As a result, social media, although intended to make connections internationally, has devastating results when it comes to both the physical and mental health of teenagers. As in 2026, the screen time by teenagers on social media has increased by a significant amount, which demands major attention and prevention ideas.¹

To analyze further, studies have revealed that 48% of teenagers admit to having their mental health harmed by social media exposure. To be more specific, one of the major and most destructive mental health effects of social media on teenagers is anxiety and depression, which is directly linked to body dysmorphia. The Cambridge dictionary defines body dysmorphia as “a condition in which someone falsely believes that there is something

seriously wrong with the size or shape of their body”, and it is more common in teenagers than most of the society thinks. This is a result of platforms fostering unrealistic body standards and promoting the ideal of a ‘skinny’ body type.² Not only that, but it is also notable that social media platforms may also act as a carrier of cyberbullying comments and harassment due to one’s appearance, which does not ‘fit’ the ‘beauty ideals’, which may result in mental disorders and thoughts about self-harm.³ While these are not all, it is significant that as a society, we consider those risks and raise awareness regarding the effects of

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social media on the mental health of teenagers.

At the same time, social media not only negatively affects the mental health of teenagers, but also their physical health. To be more specific, extreme exposure to social media might lead to disrupted sleep patterns of teenagers, as a result of late-night scrolling and the fear of missing out on a piece of information or an event that could be considered important for the ‘social media society’. Similarly, social media exposes unrealistic body and beauty ideals, which can lead to distorted eating patterns and malnutrition, considering that teenage individuals might resort to these as a way of losing weight and fitting those beauty standards. Last but not least, another equally important effect of social media includes a sedentary lifestyle for an extensive time period, by displacing physical activity, as a result of increased screen time among teenagers. Therefore, while social

media has negative effects on the mental health of teenagers, it further creates long-term issues that negatively influence their physical health.⁴

However, states all over the world have already started taking measures in order to efficiently minimize social media usage and its negative effects on teenagers. A significant example is the UK and other European Union members who are pushing their governments for bans on addictive algorithm figures and complex age verification, when it comes to the use of social media. Another country that took initiative towards tackling this issue is France, which passed laws that called for requiring parental consent for anyone under the age of 15 when it came to the use of social media. At the same time, except for bans and laws, many nations further aim to ‘re-engineer’ the way that

social media applications function.⁵ For instance, the EU Digital Services Act (DSA), established in July 2025, requires social media applications to disable certain design features that supposedly promote addiction for minors, such as autoscrolling and push notifications during night and school hours.⁶ Thus, more nations need to implement laws and take action towards tackling the issue of social media addiction and its effects on teenagers.

To conclude, social media’s negative correlation with the mental and physical health of teenagers has become stronger over the years. It has driven teenagers to seek cosmetic surgeries and appearance-enhancing

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substances, as well as other drastic ways to alter their appearance, as a means to appear as what society has defined as acceptable, from an early age. Thus, it is of major importance to consider the devastating health effects that social media exposure from a young age has on teenagers, and to seek the appropriate measures to tackle the issue.

Peaceful protests, Peaceful voices

Why is violence and its devastating consequences a common observation in protests with peaceful intentions in our day and age? When we first stumble across this question, we certainly think of it as simple and easily answered, but in actuality, there is more to it than we can recall. Indisputably, a rather prevalent assumption is that protests radicalize spontaneously, but what if external factors are also in the limelight of such occurrences?

There is no doubt that for decades now, individuals have familiarized themselves with protests as a rebellious but self-expressive way of attaining their prerequisites and goals as a society or a group probing for justice in several “unsolved” concerns.⁷ Nevertheless, in the context of societies nowadays, and their extensive dependence on technology and,

precisely, social media, youth tend to get exposed rapidly to innumerable extreme ideologies and hardly processed information. Even though that type of exposure is not always damaging, it can often lead to boundless disputes between individuals who make great use of critical and analytical thinking and others who simply comply with uncertified points of any kind that are brought up on the web apps.⁸ Being able to

identify which piece of information is valid is an intelligible but not always acquired skill when being brought up in an enormous amount of context from different people, with unquestionably different perspectives on the same matters. In that case, it is pivotal that even if an individual is unable to distinguish the above-mentioned suspicions, when deciding to promote a protesting project, he must at all times certify that radical content is cautiously removed and that he complies with the global nature of social media.

Apart from that crucial factor, though, there is more to this occurrence. During the protests, there are numerous and frequent cases in which individuals or larger groups are displeased with how efficient their act is, in terms of whether the government has taken notice of their demands and whether it has responded to them in a satisfactory way. Consequently, on the assumption that the protestors' requirements

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are entirely overlooked, they are inclined to search for alternative ways to fulfill them rapidly, even if those incorporate some kind of fierceness. Even if non-radical activists are the majority of those who play a part in such “fights” against inequity, there are still those who figure that there is no better way to request something than resolving the situation brutally. Furthermore, engaging with traditional forms of protests is not a standard practice for all, as a clever, harmless, and effective way of dealing with whatever motivated them to partake in the protest.⁹

In accordance with the Cambridge Dictionary, a radical is *a person who supports great social and political change*.¹⁰ Even though the dictionary's meaning doesn't carry a negative connotation,

when the term is used in protests, it is often accompanied by the term “extremism”, *the fact of someone having beliefs that most people think are unreasonable and unacceptable*. Most notably, when extreme ideologies make their way into protests, radicalism accelerates.

All in all, even though protests are often “overrun” by violence, they are beyond doubt an act that upholds freedom of speech and allows individuals to make way for their urgent needs. After all, as Albert Einstein once stated: *“If I were to remain silent, I'd be guilty of complicity.”*¹¹

Similarly, the issue of human cloning, which in 2011 was still at an early stage, has evolved significantly- through the constant rise of genetic engineering and synthetic biology- and there is a growing ethical debate regarding the scientific intervention in human DNA.

In addition, agenda items from 2015, such as the “legal rights of children in armed conflict”, remain deeply relevant today, especially in light of ongoing conflicts that continue to place children at the center of humanitarian crises.

Similarly, the issue of “cholera increase in South Sudan” continues to beset the country more than a decade later.

Looking back at all that has been achieved, and forward to what lies ahead, every year adds a chapter; fifteen years tell a story. A story that is far from over- one that will continue to grow, inspire, and shape the future of young leaders.

The European Green Deal and the Biodiversity Strategy for 2030

Environmental degradation has long been a matter of concern for humanity, as it directly relates to the ongoing deterioration of the planet’s natural systems. The European Green Deal, launched by the President of the European Commission, Ursula von der Leyen, in 2019, acts as a response to the young citizens’ demands for

climate action¹² and aims at facing the escalating climate and ecological crisis beyond the framework of just reducing emissions. A central component of this agenda is the EU Biodiversity Strategy for 2030, a long-term plan with the purpose of putting Europe’s biodiversity on a path of recovery¹³.

The European Green Deal invests in innovation, clean technology, and green infrastructure¹⁴ and focuses on the following objectives:

- Climate neutrality and emissions reduction
- Just and fair transition
- Carbon pricing and industrial reform

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- Clean and secure energy
- Green Industrial Competitiveness
- Circular economy
- Stakeholder engagement

Under the umbrella of the Green Deal, specific goals have been raised. More specifically, a 55% reduction of emissions is targeted by 2030 and 90% by 2040. Funding agreements have also been concurred. Firstly, 275 billion euros designated for clean investments and 200 billion euros from the EU Emissions Trading system in revenue for green and social funds. Secondly, 42% of the funds are dedicated to climate action, infrastructure, and delivering affordable, secure and sustainable energy, helping to reduce fossil fuel dependency¹⁵ and secure sustainable development.

Nevertheless, the main objective remains to make Europe the first climate-neutral continent by 2050. Achieving this,

however, will require specific measures and decisive action.

A part of this initiative is the Biodiversity Strategy for 2030. This strategy is the basis for the EU's position in international negotiations and its participation in the Convention on Global Biodiversity¹⁶. More specifically, the strategy aims at the effective tackling of threats such as forest fires, food insecurity, disease outbreaks, wildlife trade and the impacts of climate change¹⁷. The commitments and actions that need to be implemented by 2030 are firstly, establishing a larger EU-wide network of protected areas on land and at sea, focusing on the protection of areas of high biodiversity and climate value. Secondly, the launch of the EU's first Nature Restoration Regulation, a long-term

restoration objective, concerning land, sea, and species. Finally, this strategy aligns with the EU farm-to-fork strategy, a combination designed to foster collaboration and bring together nature, farmers, businesses, and consumers¹⁸.

Environmental degradation is a global issue that concerns both nations and individuals. These initiatives are two examples of the many that are formed and needed. However, it is inadequate to only plan and not actually implement. Thus, organizations such as the EU and the UN must set clear and applicable objectives and then make every possible effort to accomplish them. Finally, it is our responsibility too to care about our planet, respect our environment, and protect the inhabitants of other species, to sustain a secure living habitat for us and future generations.

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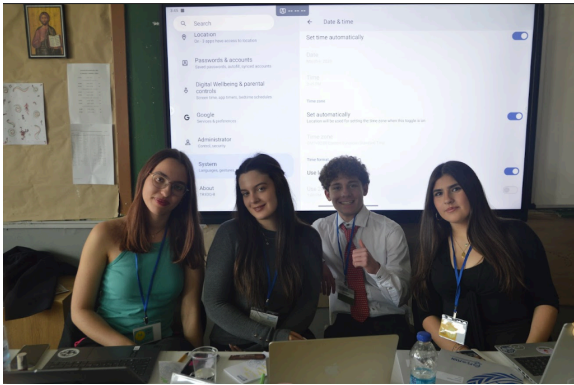
